Will MMC Have Another Boys' Flight?

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." —Philippians 4:6-7

Prayer, along with Christ, is the foundation for what we do in the Mid-Michigan Emmaus/Chrysalis community. Over the past 6 to 8 months, Mid-Michigan Chrysalis has been struggling with this question: "Should we still have a Mid-Michigan Chrysalis movement?" We have been in deep prayer and have asked the community to be in prayer for Chrysalis. In addition, we have been in communication with the Mid-Michigan Emmaus board of directors, The Upper Room in Nashville (sponsor of all Chrysalis and Emmaus activities), and other communities in Michigan. We are trying to decide our next steps for having a successful Chrysalis movement. Many ideas and suggestions have been shared, discussed, and prayed over.

As a board, we have felt Christ's nudging for something different. We don't feel he is telling us to give up on this movement, though. We feel a guiding hand for change.

With that guiding hand, we are making some changes. They will affect the board, youth, and community. We need help from the Mid-Michigan Emmaus/Chrysalis community for those changes to take place. We are one community; we are one family. Walk to Emmaus and Chrysalis cater to separate participants, but we need to work as one community, at both the adult and youth levels, to have the success that is Christ's will.

The biggest change is that we have cancelled our boy's flight for the winter. Other changes are being considered. We don't know if we will have any boys' flights in the future. We currently plan to have a girls' flight in the winter. But the girls' side of Chrysalis is also in some danger. We had to cancel the summer girls' flight because only three girls registered.

The reason we cancelled the winter boy's flight is simple. We do not have enough young men who are willing and able to serve, and who qualify to serve in the youth positions on a team. We have cancelled recent boys' flights because not enough young men registered. This situation was made worse because more of our recent butterflies were older boys, who are now too old to serve in a youth role on the team. We only have (at the longest) a 4-year window of opportunity for youth to serve in youth roles. If they are on the "old" side when they take their flight we have even less time to have them serve as a youth. Youth can only serve in a youth role in the conference room until they are 21.

We are praying that God will turn this bad situation to "good." We are praying that God will use the cancellation of the boy's flight to strengthen Chrysalis. How can that be? We have been in contact with Chrysalis leaders of Emmaus of Southeast Michigan (ESEM). They have agreed to let us send some boys to their flights to help us rebuild. This is a God thing. Just read the following God-incidents! The ESEM boys' flight is the same weekend as our boys' flight would have been. Also, it is being held in Clio, which is not far from Caro, where our flights were going to be held. How awesome is God's timing and guiding hand! The boys' flight will be on March 6-9, 2008, at Bethany UMC. We will share more when we are able to get registration forms.

God has revealed some areas where we need to grow, as well as some areas where we need to continue. We need help to execute these changes, especially from the Mid-Michigan Emmaus community.

What can you as a member of the Emmaus/Chrysalis community do? We need willing servants to serve on flights. We need adults to step up and sponsor youth on flights. (It may seem that youth should be sponsoring youth to attend Chrysalis flights.

While that is true, existing butterflies cannot be our only sponsors. Just as a youth who makes a Chrysalis flight very soon is too old to serve on team in a youth role, a youth who makes a Chrysalis flight very soon will be in an environment where he or she will no longer be in contact with youth of the age to which Chrysalis is geared. We cannot expect Chrysalis youth to do all the critical service of sponsoring youths for the Chrysalis flights.) One sponsorship opportunity is that six boys are needed to attend the boys' flight in Clio [preferably boys who, in time are willing to serve others] and six more boys will be needed to attend next year's ESEM Chrysalis boys' flight. Then we could look at a boys' flight in late 2009.

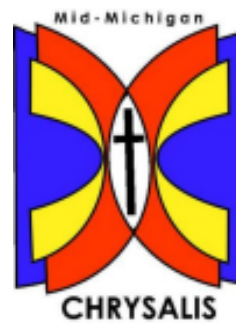
We are renewing our efforts to share Chrysalis within the church body by visiting churches and youth groups. This is where God is strongly guiding us. If you know of churches or youth groups to visit, please share them with our board members. They would love to visit. Talk to the youth who have attended a Chrysalis flight and ask them what they got out of it. Ask them why Chrysalis needs to be a vital part of the Mid-Michigan community.

We also ask for patience in the changes that come. We ask for your support. Without the support of the Mid-Michigan community, we have no Chrysalis movement. Lastly, we ask—as we started—for prayer. If prayer is all you can give right now, God bless you, because prayer is the most important gift you can give.

Serving the Lord in Ukraine

One of the talks in Emmaus is “Changing Our World.” This involves four fields of ministry: yourself, others, your community, and the world. One of the ways to reach out to the world is through missions. This summer I served on a short-term mission trip to Ukraine. I would like to share my experience. If you get the chance to serve in a similar way, and God directs you, jump at the chance. You will be extremely blessed.

The organization we went with is Master Provisions. We were part of a team of 63 people. After four days of travel, we prepared and recuperated for two days in a camp on the Black Sea. We separated into smaller groups to go to different villages. Our group of seven went to the small village of Beligorsk. Working with a local church and three interpreters, we helped put on a Bible school.

In Ukraine, it is hard to find things for children. Once or twice, we saw playground equipment that looked like it was 50 years old. The little girl in our host home didn't have toys. Her cat was her toy. As you can imagine, a Bible school would be a really big deal under these conditions. It took very little to make the kids happy.

God worked in and through us. He helped us teach the children in a fun way. Most were attentive. Some wanted to talk about their decision for Christ, and the church people with the interpreters helped us do that. Because the Bible school was held in a courtyard, parents and people on the street observed and listened. We had opportunities to talk with and pray for

adults because of this.

We were very blessed by the love extended to us from the Ukrainian Christians. They shared in our ministry and served us in practical ways. It broke our hearts to see how caring and kind they were when they had less than we did. It was also humbling to hear of their physical and spiritual struggles. When they shared some of these things, I felt inadequate. I haven't struggled like that. Who am I to give advice? All I could do is encourage them with God's love and direction. I shared hugs and tears and did a lot of praying.

With the adults, I felt like my ministry was encouragement more than anything. They've seen hardships, and their faith is strong. These Christians needed a boost of energy and reminders that God knows and cares. They needed hope. This made me realize how blessed we are to have many Christians in our community. In Ukraine, it is much harder to find true Christians for your support system. *Let me encourage you to thank God for Christian support and appreciate the fellowship you have.* It's a blessing.

We were also blessed by our team members and their support. Some of us, like my son Randy and I, dealt with lost luggage. Team members came through with needed supplies. Through many difficulties, our spirits stayed positive, and we kept each other going with the right attitude. Even when ten of the group caught a virus on our way home, we found ways to laugh, get rest, share medications, encourage one another, and see

the sights anyway. God is so good!

After leaving our village, we spent a day with the other groups where they were ministering, and we got to visit an orphanage for handicapped children. Randy described it as bitter-sweet. On one hand, it took so little to make the children happy, like blowing bubbles or throwing a frisbee. On the other hand, it was sad to see their physical struggles and lack of a family home. We only had one hour to play and bring joy that day. I hope they will run a Bible school there next time so their hearts can be ministered to. *Pray for that. It would take a special team and a willingness by the children's home to allow that to happen.*

On the plane ride home, my devotion was on the Beatitudes. (Matthew 5:1–12) After my experiences, I see these verses in a new light. Verses 3, 4, 6, 10, and 11 talk about struggles that result in blessings. I saw this in Ukraine. *Don't ever be sorry about trials. These are the times that God gets*

our attention and blesses us the most. Verses 5, 7, 8, and 9 talk about personal characteristics that can be used to bless others. We all have God-given talents and characteristics that can be used to bring glory to God, whether it be half-way around the world or right in our backyard. No longer will I say others are more talented. If

God directs me, He will give me what is necessary. He will be glorified, and I will be blessed, too. *We all have a unique purpose in the quest to reveal God's Glory to the world.* Praise God! SLAVA BOGU!

I know others in Mid-Michigan Emmaus who have been on mission trips. It is interesting and encouraging to hear how God works through missions. Let me encourage you to share your experience in “Going Fourth” so we all can hear about the blessings, pray for future trips, and be encouraged to serve in this field of ministry.

Think and Pray Before You Sponsor

Chapter 3 of *The Upper Room Handbook on Emmaus*, one of the documents that define the Emmaus model, asks: Why do we sponsor? I have heard many reasons:

- Emmaus would really help them.
- They need Emmaus to deal with their personal problems.
- They don't know enough about God.
- They need to go to church more.
- They need to get their life together.

These may be good reasons for prayer, spiritual counseling, or just being a Christian friend, but none of them are reasons to attend an Emmaus Walk.

The purpose of Emmaus is to renew the church as the body of the risen Christ in the world through the renewal of Christians as faithful and committed disciples of Jesus Christ—to build leaders for the church.

Now I admit that Walk to Emmaus has helped me become a better per-

son, not just a better church leader. But we do people we seek to sponsor (and the Emmaus movement) a disservice when we do not take sponsorship seriously. Here are a few questions to ask yourself before you ask someone to go on a walk.

- How long have I prayed for and about this person before I talk to them?
- Do I have direction from God?
- Have I been untruthful in anything I have said to this person to get them to agree to go?
- Can this person physically and emotionally handle a walk?

Now please, before you hang me, let me explain. In the past we have had pilgrims who have had physical challenges: cancer, disabilities, illnesses. None of these is in itself a reason not to sponsor. What you need to ask is, are they willing to assist the team in

their limitation? Will they monitor their health to assist the team? Do they keep themselves as healthy as possible on the walk so that they can participate to the fullness of their limitation? Will the building allow full participation in the walk? (Some do, some don't. Ask the registrar if you're unsure.) Also be aware of emotional challenges. For example, a person going through a life crisis should not take a walk. Help them seek the help they need to get through the crisis first, so that when they do take an Emmaus Walk they can devote their self fully to the weekend.

- Have I explained the purpose of the weekend? (To develop Christian leaders)
- Do I understand the "equal commitment rule"?

This means that if you talk to a married person about attending an Emmaus Walk, you should talk to both spouses about the opportunity.

From the *Handbook*: "The Walk to Emmaus should not become a divisive influence in a marriage. Disregard for the rule may not result in marital tensions. But the Emmaus Movement attempts to strengthen marriages and to avoid practices that may have the potential to affect a marriage adversely." This rule is important wisdom, but not law.

- Have I told them *everything* they need to feel comfortable going away for the weekend?

Remember, in Emmaus *there are no secrets!* (Except maybe which table gets picked first for meals. And if you ask nicely, I'll tell you that one, too.)

When you took your Emmaus Walk you received a paper titled "Sponsorship: the Most Important Job of All" in your take-home packet. Before you talk to someone about Emmaus, re-read that. If you need a copy let me know. Sponsorship is the most important job, and that's why there are guidelines. So please take a few minutes to read, and then take lots of time in prayer. God knows who you are to sponsor next.

Reach Out to Potential Butterflies

Obviously, the main problem within Chrysalis that is hindering the prosperity of the movement is outreach. Butterflies, maybe there are friends or relatives of yours that could greatly benefit from Chrysalis just like you did. Think! A wonderful opportunity awaits your teen friends, and what a superb way to serve God by lighting the fire in your friends' hearts for Jesus! I know that many teens are extremely busy, but take some time to think about possible caterpillars and make the effort to be their sponsor.

Emmaus adults, maybe you don't know enough about Chrysalis to realize that someone in your life is eligible to be a caterpillar. Chrysalis is for teens that are entering the tenth grade through their freshmen year in col-

lege. Like Emmaus, Chrysalis is a retreat for Christians that is designed to strengthen relationships with God so that when a "caterpillar" transforms into a "butterfly" they may be an awesome witness to the world and for Christ. Do you remember when you completed your walk? Invite a teen to attend Chrysalis, and they can experience the same feeling you did.

Like Emmaus, butterflies are encouraged to attend a reunion group so that they stay in step with God. Maybe some of you Chrysalis butterflies do not have reunion groups and your relationship with God is suffering because of that. I encourage you to join or form a reunion group. It doesn't have to be with the butterflies of your weekend or even people from Chrysalis. You can meet on your own schedule with your friends. That way you won't stutter in your walk with Christ.

So, please pray for Chrysalis and reach out to the people you know to become caterpillars. It means a lot to the movement and it will mean a lot to them. God Loves You and So Do I, —
